Look for leaves that are alternate and compound-palmate with 9 to 17 lance-shaped leaflets that are 3-15 cm long. The leaves are smooth on top and hairy on bottom.

Lupine is a herbaceous (nonwoody), perennial (living three or more years) plant. The flowers grow on 1.5 m tall spikes and are usually blue to purple in the wild.

Stem

Look for stems that are unbranched, short, and hollow. Lupine stems are usually smooth.

Seasonal Change

Lupine flowers bloom in May and June. The seeds of the plant are in hairy pods that mature in late summer. The seeds spread when the pods open explosively.

Similar Species

Lupine can be confused with steplebush. However, steplebush (*Spiraea tomentosa*) flowers are "fuzzy" while lupine flowers are smooth with no hairs. Also, steplebush leaves are toothed while lupine leaves are smooth.

Did You Know?

Lupine is typically a bitter-tasting weed. Some cultivated varieties of lupine have been bred to be sweeter for use as a food crop for animals. Lupines also symbolize imagination in the flower world!
